# Unparalleled Success

The new Fates Warning album is out and it is extraordinary! Called "Parallels", it is a leap to an entirely new level for the band. The album features sparkling production from Terry Brown that really highlights the tight ensemble work, and the individual performances have never sounded better! Lovers of Fates' always profound lyrics and breathtaking solos will not be disappointed, but the album offers some surprises, too.

First, this album demonstrates that Ray has the best vocal midrange in rock. The next surprise is the bistication, this

power and sophistication: this album is progressive without being self-consciously "artsy". It has drawn both from the best of the prog-rock sensibilities and the strength of metal to create an original sound that may be a beacon to guide music through the nineties.

Fans of Fates' most esoteric work might be a little surprised by how "listenable" the album is, but won't be disappointed by the mini-epic entitled "The Eleventh Hour" reminiscent of "The Ivory Gate of Dreams" or the drive of "Don't Follow Me". Most extraordinarily, much of the album breaks new ground that was just scratched at with "Perfect Symmetry". Out of respect for his desire for privacy, we feel it is better both to look backward appreciatively at his recorded work and forward to progress of the band he was instrumental in forming. While he has not had much contact with the other guys in the band of late, we are sure that he is still writing evocative poetry like that which can be found on Fates' first three albums.

#### Musicians' Corner

In this issue, we will take a look at some of the hardware that Frank used to produce his remarkable sound on "Parallels". Although computeraided editing and motorized consoles bring a high level of control and accuracy to the production of an album, what comes out can sound no better than what the musicians put in. Each member of the band has put much thought, listening and effort into developing an individual and yet harmonious sound, Frank being no exception. Listening carefully to any of the band's albums reveals not only thoughtfully woven musical threads, but great attention to the textures of each of those threads. This texture is part expression, part technique and part technology. We will cover the fundamentals of technique and the difficult issue of artistic expression in future issues -- for now, lets look at the nuts and bolts.

Here's the bad news: while it's possible to sound great for cheap, the results are just as likely to be awful or inconsistent. For a professional musician this can be frustrating at best and disastrous at worst. Precise and reproduceable control of sound from track to track or gig to gig means the artist can concentrate on playing instead of fiddling with knobs. To this end Frank has abandoned his old pedals for rack mounted digitally controlled effects. Being able to preset effects loops and then call them up from a single foot control not only cuts down on tangled wires and multiple stomping, it makes possible literally dozens of effects combinations and settings that can be tailored down to individual phrases in songs. There are very few bands in music today that pay as much

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attention to tonal coloration and expression as FW, and while effects are no substitute for expression, careful control of effects allows that expression to come through unimpeded.

On "Parallels", every element in the sound path, from the pick to the amplifier, was given consideration. There are basically four guitar sound qualities captured on the album: acoustic, clean, semi-dirty and dirty. Each sound required a different combination of instruments, effects and amps. Frank's choice for acoustic is an Ovation Elite with built-in pickup and EQ. Thanks to its graphite neck and body geometry, it has a clear, ringing tone that doesn't get lost in the din.

Also heavy on the graphite was the Steinberger Frank used in combination with a G-K Solid State head for ultra-clean sounds. The band was looking for the exact opposite of the warm sound of an old guitar through a tube amp, and this was it. In addition to having one of the best tremolo systems ever designed, this high-tech graphite neck guitar has seemingly endless sustain. Because of the stiffness of the material, it does not "absorb" as many frequencies as a wood neck. As a result, every note has a much richer overtone series and an almost brittle sound. These unique qualities would be lost passing through a vacuum tube, so the G-K was a natural choice.

The warm, semi-dirty sounds were achieved with, as you probably guessed, an old guitar through a tube amp. You can't get the sound that comes from seasoned wood and pickups mellowed by time in any other way. In this case, the guitar was a Gibson ES-345 semi-hollowbody rewired in mono with the tone controls by-passed, and the amp was a Mesa/Boogie Mark IV. Frank said that even running clean, the old Gibson has a special distortion.

Finally we come to the dirty sound, used for many of the rhythm tracks and most of the leads. The best guitar around for the task was a Jackson Custom model with a Stealth body. The neck is very playable, and the body features a beautifully sculpted cutaway. Frank used the semi-dirty amp combo and a rack of effects. The main element of the effects arsenal is a pair of A.R.T. Multiverb 3's. They offer a wide range of features, including harmonization, hall effects, sampling, distortion and EQ. The settings are programmable and come with presets. Equally versatile is a Rane MIDI programmable EQ, which features multi-channel mixing capability and digital interface. Keeping noise down is a Hush unit. Power conditioning and distribution are supplied by a Furman -- all this with a couple of rack spaces to spare. Finally, all the effects loops are actuated by a single "smart" pedal board, making life a little less confusing.

I would be remiss if I did not mention a couple of items without which there would be no guitars on "Parallels": Frank used Dunlop Derlin 1,4mm picks and Dean Markley Blue Steel strings, .009-.045 gauge.

Obviously, there is a difference between having the tools and knowing how to use them. In future columns we will learn how Frank puts this equip-

# Answer to Pop Quiz

Fates Warning and Madonna both have an album mixed in "Q-Sound", the latest advance in production technology,

Q-Sound offers vastly improved audio imaging from stereo speakers. Where a normal recording "locates" instruments from left to right between the speakers, a Q-Sound recording offers three dimensional imagery, with the sound seeming to come from in front of, behind, wider than, even above the speaker locations. And it manages to do this with no special adapters or processors. Under the right conditions, it will produce a "sound stage" that approximates an actual stage, with precise locations of instruments, and solos that travel around the room.

To take advantage of Q-Sound, you must be careful about speaker placement and find the "sweet spot" (usually a point midway between the speakers, about 1.4 x the width of the speaker placement away). It will be worth the effort — I heard one of the solos fly in from another room! Needless to say, the band takes advantage of Q-sound, and we hope you can too.
